

Campus Ministry begins another school year ready to serve the spiritual needs of the Daemen College community.

Father Mark Illig is the new director although he has been serving on campus for three previous years. Father Mark is also assigned to Daemen as Catholic Campus Minister, by the Diocese of Buffalo and works at St. Benedict's Church at Main St. and Eggert Rd. Joanne Stiller is also a Catholic Campus Minister and this is her second year working on the Campus Ministry Staff. Reverend John Wetherwax is the Campus Minister for the Protestant students. Reverend John is also pastor of Cleveland Hill Methodist Church. Dr. Larry Wright continues his work among the Daemen students. Although he is no longer of the Campus Ministry team.

Campus Ministry provides worship services every Sunday, while school is in session. Catholic Mass is offered at 4:00 pm. Evening worship for Protestants with Reverend John Wetherwax is offered at 5:30 pm. Both are held in Alumni Lounge in Wick Center. Fr. Mark will hear confessions from 3:15 to 3:45 pm each Sunday in the Campus Ministry Office. A "cookie chat" will be offered the last Sunday of the month from 2 to 3 pm, in our office. A "dream workshop" led by Joanne Stiller will be offered in the Alumni Lounge every Sunday from 2 to 3:30 pm, beginning October 1st.

Retreats, field trips, and other opportunities for spiritual growth will be offered during the year. Let us serve you! Our office is located to the left of the main entrance of Wick Center. Commuter students: you are also welcome to join us!

Daemen's Liberty Partnership Program

Daemen, Buffalo State, Genessee, Alfred, St. Lawrence, Potsdam, Erie Community College, St. Bonaventure, Nyack College, SUNY at Morrisville, Brockport, and Villa Maria; all these colleges have accepted Liberty Partnership high school students. This is a real achievement because each and every one of the Liberty Partnership Program participants was originally identified as being in real danger of dropping out of school. What made the difference? What changed potential dropouts into high school graduates? For these young people, the Daemen College Liberty Partnership Program (DCLPP) was the answer.

Daemen College, as part of its on-going efforts to address societal concerns, works in partnership with South Park High School and School #33 Bilingual Center School in the Buffalo Public School System. The program, now in its sixth year of operation, is funded by the State Education Department's Bureau of College, School, and Community Collaboration, and provides services to 180 high school and middle school students and their families. Sixth through twelfth graders make up the student population. Students from multi-racial, multi-lingual, and multiethnic groups participate in a variety of activities, many of which are offered both in English and in Spanish.


The DCLPP is designed to facilitate and enhance the education of our youth at risk. The program's goals are to increase academic performance levels, enhance the students' self-image, and increase school attendance.

The DCLPP has several components. The academic component takes the form of tutoring (both individual and group), and homework assistance, with a focus on core curriculum areas. Beyond academic support, at risk students require additional personal and social support services to enable them to stay in school. Provision of support services of this scope must and are approached as a collaborative effort involving students, parents, and the community.

Career awareness is also a component of the program and provides opportunities for students to obtain an increased understanding of the world of work. Career workshops, individual discussion, in-school college search seminars, interactions with role models and tours of business sites facilitate this objective.

The DCLPP is located in Office#7in Canavan Hall. Traci Jackson is the Director of the program, Alex Navarro and Frank Armstead are Field Site Coordinators, and Maria Rose is the Secretary/Administrative Assistant. Students and faculty are invited to stop by and visit the office!

C E L E B R A T E National Physician Assistant Day!

October 6th has been designated National Physician Assistant Day. This day has been set aside to commemorate the graduation of the first class of Physician Assistants from Duke University in 1967. The PA profession was developed to take people with prior health care experience and educate them to provide cost-effective patient care in medically underserved areas. In the past quarter century, over 30,000 PAs have graduated programs across the country. They work in every area of medicine, including primary care, surgery, orthopedics, pediatrics, OB/GYN, psychiatry, and every medical subspecialty. Physician Assistants also work in health care administration and are major contributors to medical research, and employment opportunities continue to grow for the profession.

Physician Assistants are highly skilled health care providers who work with the supervision of a physician, extending patient care to millions of Americans each day. In 1993 alone, PAs provided care for over 152 million patient visits. PAs perform medical histories and physical exams, order, administer, and interpret lab tests, and diagnose and treat illnesses and injuries. In most states,

PAs can write prescriptions. PAs work in rural, suburban, and urban communities at hospitals, in physician's offices, clinics, and HMOs, correctional facilities, the armed services, and even the White House. A major focus of Physician Assistant care is preventive medicine -- educating patients and their families about health care strategies to live longer, healthier, and more productive lives.

Daemen College has the unique distinction of being home to the newest PA program in New York State, and we, in the PA Program, would like to invite all students, faculty, staff, and community members to help us celebrate National PA Day. On Friday, October 6th from 8 am to 12 noon in Wick Center, guest speakers, audio-visual presentations, and Physician Assistants who serve the community will be available to answer questions about the PA profession, the PA Program at Daemen, and provide information about preventive medicine strategies.
