

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

Wait for gym Continues as the Price Tag Rises

As you might know, Daemen students have been promised an athletic facility for a while now. Students have come and gone and no such facility has been built, let alone even started. The truth is, it has been proposed since 1974.

By 1977, the funds for the building had been collected and Dr. Robert Marshall, President of Daemen College, wanted a ground breaking ceremony to begin the construction since the funds for the gym had been collected. This was suggested in 1975, and still hasn't come about. One possible draw back for the gym is that, although they have the funds to build it, they didn't have the funds to maintain it.

Presently, according to Ken Murray, Athletic Director, we now have to go

around and beg institutions to use their facilities for our basketball team. With our gym, the team members could practice at their leisure.

The proposed gym would be 115 ft. x 90 ft. in dimension. It would house one regulation basketball court, along with two weight rooms and fully equipped

locker rooms for both men and women. It would have a 600 person capacity for basketball games and between a 1,000-1,200 person capacity for concerts, lectures, or any other large activities. The gym is scheduled to take twelve to eighteen months to construct and the present projected cost is approximately \$1.6 million. In one year, if the ground isn't broken, the cost will rise to approximately \$2 million.

Ken Murray, who's been the Athletic Director for the past four years, said "that if the gym isn't built within the next year or so, it'll probably never be built. If that's the case, the athletics will

If the gym was built, according to Murray, it would improve the current intercollegiate programs, give us our own home court, widen the range of activities, and would also be an alternative to the Rat.

Murray said he would like to see it connected to the Wick Center because Wick is the hub of the campus. That site is impossible though due to the ground conditions adjacent to Wick. The ground there isn't stable. Tests were taken to see which spot was best for the construction. The front lawn was chosen. Behind Rosary Hill and near the tennis courts the lands is too muddy and swampy. Murray also said that the school would like to show off the new gym; it's more noticable in the front. It would also be more accessable to the Amherst community if need be.

Russ Micoli, President of the Student Association, commented that this site would be good in case the school chooses to hold any activities that would directly involve the Amherst community. Such activities could include a sum-

mer basketball league, a summer camp, or lectures. Russ also agrees with Murray*that the gym could house rock concerts and other activities.

Another point Ken and Russ agreed on was that the gym would be a good place to blow off steam. Not everything would be alcohol-related. Dorm damage would decrease. We could expand our curriculum to include recreation majors, sports medicine, and other majors of the same sort. "The gym would increase enrollment at Daemen as well as graduate a better rounded individual from Daemen College (ready academically as well as socially and physically)."

Russ feels very positive about the whole thing. We are close now to a gym than before. The trustees know we need it; the time is now we need a gym. It isn't the trustees alone who want the gym. The basketball team wants it too.

As Basketball player Skip McDougal put it, "it bothers me not to have it." He doubts it will be built while he's here. The other basketball players agree. Kymm Carey, also agrees with Skip that it won't be built in the near future. Kymm Carey also added, "they don't let us know where our money goes." Jonathan Wiggins agreed with him on that. Jonathan also said that they shouldn't promise it if we can't get it. According to Michael Barnes, with the amount of tuition we pay, there should be adequate gym facilities. "The activity fee increased but the activities decreased."

For the most part, most of the old basketball players wouldn't comment because the whole situation with the gym aggrivates them. They just want it built, and soon.

taken down and, though later returned, were too badly torn to be put back up. New statements are being submitted by the four contenders. As a result of this mishap, voting will be held October 5 and 6, with the winners being announced at dinner October 7.

The third copy of the Warning slips is sent to the Governing Board. The Governing Board then makes recommendations to Ron Hunter. The other two copies are put into the student's folder and a dorm folder. When a student goes before the Judicial Board the student's folder is examined and considered together with the recommendations of the Governing Board. Disciplinary action is then taken and could involve payment for damages, restrictions as to where on campus the warned student is allowed, and Resident students can be removed from campus if

they receive three Warning slips.

A total of \$3,084.00 was spent for the movies for the semester. This was a package deal which saved us \$1500.00. Copies of the schedule of movies are available. Some of the movies to be shown include Private Benjamin, And Justice For All, Altered States, Busting Loose, and Slapshot.

Unification of commuters and residents is important to Chris Schraff.





GENESIS CHANGES PACE ON NEW ALBUM

Genesis, that tremendous progressive rock trio, has once again proved to be one of the greatest bands playing today. Their new album, "Abacab", is the latest in a long list of great albums. It displays the vast talents of Tony Banks, Mike Rutherford and Phil Collins. Even though "Abacab" does not match the creativity and orginality of former Genesis albums such as "A Trick of the Tail" and "The Lamb Lies Down On Broadway", it is still an excellent album in its own right.

Rutherford's bass and guitar playing is extraordinary, Bank's keyboards are no less than amazing, and Collins' drumming and vocals are once again flawless. The title track displays the talents of



these three artists to the fullest.

The single "No Reply At All", is the only questionable track on the album. The band is accompanied by the "Earth, Wind and Fire" brass section, which was fine for Collins' solo LP, but glues Genesis to much of a commercialized, "pop" music sound. The other tracks onthe album are more in keeping with the classic Genesis style, but nonetheless further the development of Genesis into

the 1980's.

Truly, "Abacab" is a must for all Genesis fans and anyone interested in music with a change of pace. The album is full of tight instrumentation and clean production, even though co-producer and engineer David Hentschel is absent from this album. All in all, Genesis has brought forth yet another great album with the potential to be one of the best albums of the year.
